


# TALENT, SKILL AND DEDICATION: THE INGREDIENTS FOR A PREMIER ART SHOW



As the language about climate shifts from "change" to "crisis" to "emergency", the sense we need to act intensifies. In order to engage in climate action, we need to feel we can make a difference. We need to see that new technologies work to reduce carbon output. We need to know that our small changes – sweeping rather than vacuuming – add up when many people make these changes. But I also think we need to be able to picture a different future from the one we are headed toward.

By popular demand our Summer Art for Kids returns on Tuesday mornings 10:30am-12:00pm or Thursday afternoons 1:00-2:30pm in July and August. We welcome your kiddos, aged 6 to 11, to explore different craft and art projects each week. We have added Art for Youth for 12-18 year olds on Wednesday afternoons from 1:00-3:00pm. Participants will work on art projects that include instructions on drawing, collaging, painting, composition, and colour theory.

Another exciting addition for select Thursday mornings is Polymer Clay Adventures. In this hands-on workshop with guest instructor Christian Camp, kids will learn about

different tools and equipment and how to condition their clay and mix colours, using their imagination to create unique figurines.

Do you want to introduce your teen to a different type of creativity? On July 14 or August 11 from 1:00-3:00pm we are offering Teens: Introduction to Encaustic. This medium uses heat, beeswax with resin, and pigment to make completely unique art. Participants will learn safe use of the equipment while experimenting with many encaustic techniques. Teens will learn fusing, carving and scraping, image transfers, and stencils.

# WHAT EXACTLY IS TAROT ABOUT ANYWAY?

The standard playing card deck has a total of 52 cards in four suits of 13 cards each. The tarot card deck has 78 cards: four suits of 14 cards, plus 22 cards, commonly referred to as the Major Arcana, each representing a particular figure or concept. The tarot emerged in the Renaissance in Italy as a card game, and it was not until the late 18th century in France that it was first used for fortune telling. The occult use of tarot cards exploded in popularity in North America in the 1960s and tarot decks continue to be widely used today, including in clinical psychology, as a tool for understanding

and exploration of the self.

Artists have been drawn to the tarot through the centuries and have created their own interpretations of the figures and archetypes represented by the cards. Grey Gallery will host The Art of the Tarot, an exhibition curated by guest artist Lydia Knox, featuring interpretations of the tarot by more than a dozen local artists. As well, a collection of 200 depictions of the Magician card by different artists will be on display, courtesy of Tim Nicholls Harrison. Visit Grey Gallery in downtown Owen Sound between June 14 and July 29 to see The Art of the Tarot.

# STARFEST AUGUST 17-20

Have you ever been to a Star Party? It's a place where amateur astronomers come together to share their passion for the night sky. People camp and bring their telescopes, binoculars, or just their eyes. There's no campfires and no lights, unless they're red lights. As dark skies get harder and harder to find, people drive from cities to a place where they can still see the heavens. And the party starts after dark – as most good parties do – with a chance to walk around and look through a myriad of telescopes, some even requiring ladders to get to the eyepiece.

Starfest – a three day event from August 17-20 – is Canada's largest annual Astronomy Conference and Star Party. It is held at the River Place Campground near Mount Forest. BBC rated it one of the top ten star parties in the world. This year Starfest celebrates 40 years.

During the day, there are astronomy talks given by professional astronomers and advanced amateurs on a variety of topics, from observing and imaging to the latest cutting-edge astronomical science. There's also imaging workshops,

vendor booths, swap tables, kidsfest, door prizes, and an imaging contest with awards in several categories.

This year's theme is Charting the Universe. From ancient times to modern days, charts have been used to help us visualize and understand the nature of the universe. This year, we look at how these charts have been used and continue to be used to direct our exploration of the universe, from personal observing and imaging sessions to leading edge research.

Our Friday keynote speakers are: **Fred Espenak** (Scientist Emeritus, NASA's GSFC), The Great North American Eclipse 2024; and **Dr. Tony Noble** (Scientific Director of the McDonald Institute), Shedding Light on Dark Matter, Neutrinos, and the missing mass in the Universe. Our Saturday Keynote Speaker is **Dr. Katherine Mack** (Hawking Chair in Cosmology and Science Communications at the Perimeter Institute). Her research considers dark matter, vacuum decay, the formation of galaxies, and more!



Intersections Wood Collaborative (IWC), with the support of a federal New Horizons Grant for Seniors, is pleased to announce a two-part Intergenerational Woodworking Program to create a welcoming experience that features activity-based projects to build skills and social connection.

The first part is the creation of a regular weekly day time drop-in program for seniors at the storefront wood shop, enhanced by the development of an on-line social networking platform – a dedicated chat room for the exchange of information and support.

The second part is three, 3-week summer sessions for youth ages 13 to 18 in July and August. Youth will work alongside experienced senior woodworkers in a supervised setting. Lunch will be provided on site to promote fellowship. Participants will build their confidence and skill in basic woodworking techniques. In addition to registrants from the community, IWC is grateful to be working with M'Wikwedong Friendship Centre and Big Brothers/Big Sisters. "This project provides meaningful opportunities for mentorship, skill development and community building, all of which are invaluable experiences for the youth attending," says Beth Aubrey, Executive Director, Big Brothers Big Sisters of Grey Bruce and Western Simcoe.

IWC runs a woodworking shop in downtown Owen Sound from a highly



visible storefront location. We aim to be a place for woodworkers and those who love wood to connect, learn and collaborate with classes, exhibits, and events that serve a wide spectrum of interests regardless of skill level. 



# TEARDROPPING AROUND GREY-BRUCE

I live off-grid, solar-powered, on 50 acres of forest just outside Owen Sound. As the UPS guy once said when handing off a parcel, "You live in paradise." Grateful as I am to look out my windows at woodland paradise everyday, I do sometimes yearn for a change of scenery. Especially after a long winter.


Last spring, I began touring around Grey-Bruce and beyond in a tiny teardrop trailer. This quirky little crossover between camping and RVing is like a scaled-down version of my off-grid home life: small, self-sufficient, and pragmatic yet comfortable, it allows me to maintain a small footprint on the world. A teardrop trailer like the one my dog Luna and I travel in allows the freedom to get away from it all without the challenge of leaving it all behind. The experience is closer to camping than RVing, but in this version of camping the bed is comfortable, the interior is dry, and the kitchen is always ready at hand. Everything you need is packaged together in under 1000 pounds, towable by most any car.

The views, and locales, are endless. A few kind landowners in Grey-Bruce and Manitoulin allow me to overnight but I also enjoy camping at local parks including MacGregor Point, Cyprus Lake, and you won't find a much



sweeter life than gazing out at the awesome escarpment from a peaceful waterfront site at Cape Croker Park in the shoulder-season. We have so many scenic roads in our area – I've never stopped at the same place twice to enjoy lunch with a view!

# BARNS OF THE QUEEN'S BUSH WITH JON RADOJKOVIC

On July 29 at 1:00pm, barn historian, author, and timber framing expert Jon Radojkovic will host an experiential "Barns of the Queen's Bush" talk in Cargill, once home to Bruce County's largest barn. Jon first became interested in barns in 1984 after building a timber frame house from trees on his farm near Chesley, using mostly hand tools the original builders would have used. From there he began to build timber frame structures for others including some barns.

Radojkovic says: "Heritage barns are not only beautiful pieces of architecture and craftsmanship, they contribute to our rural landscape and as they disappear Ontario's landscape is permanently changed." Henry Cargill, Bruce County's leading industrialist and employer in the late 1800s, built Bruce County's largest barn from virgin timber harvested from the Greenock Swamp. Tragically, this barn was lost to fire in the 1950s, but another barn built by Henry Cargill remains on the edge of the village.

Radojkovic's talk on July 29 will include an overview of



barn building tools and techniques, and a book signing. For more information on this event, contact kmckague@gmail. com.

# **GET INTO THE SPIRIT**

The Tom Thomson Art Gallery has teamed up with Coffin Ridge Winery to create an Artist Edition series of wine, cider, and beer inspired by Canada's most iconic artist, Tom Thomson. These one-of-a-kind beverages will launch throughout the spring and summer and are part of a larger Tom Thomson tour that links the Winery, historic locations in Leith, the local hiking trail, and the Art Gallery.

Tom Thomson (1877-1917) is one of the most influential artists of the 20th century and was buried just 12km away from Coffin Ridge in Leith, Ontario (where he grew up). He died in a tragic accident on Canoe Lake, Algonquin Park, at the age of 39 but the actual cause of his death remains an unsolved mystery to this day.

The Thomson-themed custom crafted wine, cider, and beer are made from grapes grown on Thomson's old stomping grounds. This summer watch for: **Night Spirit**, a unique bourbon barrelled Marquette wine, which is a nod to Tom Thomson's revolutionary artistic approach; **Brush with Death**, a cider that bursts with earthy notes reminiscent of the woods; and **Tombstone Tom**, a one-of-a kind beer that will be created in Coffin Ridge's new brewery.

Hike the Tom Thomson Trail, stop for some Tom-inspired bevvies, visit his grave and the historic Leith Church where he frequented, and explore the Art Gallery which is custodian of the fourth largest public collection of Tom's works in the world and the only gallery to be built solely through the contributions of his friends and family.

We hope you'll get into the spirit and enjoy the beauty of this area the way Tom would have!

Neil was born in Poole, England, a place he always held dear to his heart. When he was young, his family relocated to Owen Sound where he spent the majority of his life; eventually, he settled in Halifax where he worked as a respected tour guide and as an actor, with roles in several films and TV shows with the highlight being in his cherished Trailer Park Boys series. Neil was an exceptional drummer, played in numerous bands across the country, and made lifelong friends along the way. He loved music, worked hard, embraced his talents, and chased his dreams; he took chances and made people smile every day.

On learning of his passing, local musician Brian Tannahill remembered Neil "grooving on stage and laying down the most excellent beat." Brian wrote this:






